Occupational Health and Safety Hazards in violation with the Canada Labour Code, by Industry, from 2016 to 2020

The tables below recapitulate the main areas of concern by sector of activity. These have been identified through an analysis of violations to the Canada Labour Code – Part II Occupational Health and Safety and its pursuant regulations, as observed and recorded during inspections/audits conducted throughout the reporting period (2016-2020). The areas of concern that are material to these industries relate to the management of hazardous substances, material handling, first aid administration, maintenance of permanent structures, electrical safety, tools and machinery safety, safe occupancy of workplaces, harassment and violence prevention in the workplace, the elaboration of hazard prevention programs as well as hazardous occurrence investigation and reporting under the Canadian Occupational Health and Safety Regulations.
